12 intrepid birders began a morning-long quest to see ducks and other birds along the St. Clair River. It was a cloudy day with temps near 30°F and there was very little wind. We began at the St. Clair Metropark nature center by walking back to see the Great Horned Owl that resides in the park. After observing him and a few other birds in the woods and parking lot, we headed north to the river.

Birding along the river was very quiet. There were very few birds on the river, primarily because of the warm winter and lack of ice. This did not force a concentration of birds much of anywhere. We di stop at a small park near Selfridge Air Force base and saw large flotillas of ducks. Mostly, we observed, Canvasbacks, Common and Redbreasted Mergansers along with a few Redheads.

Along the river, it was quiet. We finally reached Port Huron and found a few gulls with a Glaucous Gull amongst the Herring and Ring-billed Gulls hear the yacht club. At Lighthouse Park, we did see some additional Long-tailed Ducks and a personal record of 26 White-winged Scoters.



We did not see the Peregrine Falcon at the train trestle bridge or the Blue Water Bridge, but he redeemed himself by doing a flyover at the beach at the park right before we headed home. Nice finish to a quiet day. The group enjoyed some life birds, always

a nice thing for a leader to enjoy. We saw 30 species on this trip. Maybe next year will be better?!
